The Event is controlled from the caravan, positioned at the car park at the Village Hall, by a team working in shifts for the c. 16 hours (daylight) when the bike ride is held over a 24 hour period. The caravan is linked to all marshals by 2-way radios. A security vehicle patrols the course approximately every 30 minutes or more often if required. The security vehicle is connected to the caravan by 2-way radio. The 2-way radios are sound checked every half hour.

9	Control on the circuit at night - Marshal points	X	X	X						M	H	6	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • During the hours of darkness the Marshal points are lit by electric task lighting powered from local residents properties, generators or batteries (that are set back off the road) to assist the riders. • The Marshals' duties include notifying the Control Caravan of any problems on the Circuit. At night this can include riders without lights, sometimes the result of flat batteries. Warning riders of the occasional vehicle moving against the flow of the riders, help and advice when taking the corners at night. Helping any rider who has a problem, puncture for instance and making sure the riders follow the circuit. • Also communicate with car drivers who have seen the signs and wonder what is happening, if they stop and ask.
10	General public driving their vehicles on the circuit at night	X	X	X						M	H	6	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If a driver stops to ask a Marshal what is happening it gives the Marshal the opportunity to explain about the Event. • If the driver does not stop the Marshall notifies the Control Caravan of the car on the circuit and this information is passed to all the marshals who can then warn the riders of the situation.
11	Control on the circuit at night - security vehicle				X					L	M	2	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In conjunction with the Control Caravan and the marshals the Security vehicle is used to maintain the lighting and 2-way radios during the event night. • It will also assist riders who have problems with their bikes, e.g. punctures and check out riders who have no lights. • By circuiting frequently it helps maintain the circuit and communication with the marshals.
12	Control of the circuit at night - generally.	X	-	-	-	-	-	-		M	M	4	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Circa 120-150 small flashing beacons are positioned around the circuit to help the riders follow the roads. • Following discussions with the riders these lamps are positioned on the right hand side of the road. The distance apart depends on how straight the road is.

This helps with the recognition of a particular rider. • Each rider also wears a wristband which has a particular number printed on it specific to that rider linking back to their registration details in the case of an emergency.

X	X	X						M	M	2	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All residents who live on the circuit receive a written notification of when the event is taking place. There is considerable cyclist focused signage on the circuit which indicates to the public that the Event is taking place. Where a driver stops to ask for information, the Marshall may talk to the driver and explain what is going on. If a driver blatantly ignores all the signs the Marshall notifies the Control Caravan to issue a warning to the other marshals about this vehicle. At the Team Captains briefing on the Saturday morning, the possibility of other vehicles being on the road is discussed, with safety being paramount and correct road usage requested.
16	Parking - access and egress from designated parking area.	X	X	X						L	M	2	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Entrance and exit signage to be prominently displayed at the event itself. The parking site is adjacent to the event and does not inhibit the running of the event as the flow of cyclists is in a different direction. predominantly once cars are parked they remain unused until the conclusion of the event due to the Le-Mans approach. Use of additional marshals is considered at peak times. An additional Marshall may be positioned at the Village Hall marshalling point for the first hour of the Event to help deal with the initial flow of participants and traffic.

32	Grass verges - on various sections of the circuit the grass verges are in a bad state. If a cyclist is required to pull off the road to allow a car / lorry to pass, this manoeuvre must be carried out with great care. Hopefully the Councils will support the event and repair the roads to a suitable condition. • The Bike Ride course committee inspect the road the evening before and the morning of the event and will make every effort to inform cyclists of any potential dangerous sections of the road way at the morning briefing
